The first big project I faced when it came to Buildings & Grounds was getting the epoxy floor installed on the lower level floor. With the Governor mandating us to be closed earlier this year, it was the perfect time to tackle this project, instead of waiting until we were closed in January. I have also come to rely on our resident handyman, Roger Johnson. There is nothing this man can't do. If something needs to be done or fixed, he will figure out a way.

We have a dedicated group of volunteers that I've had the pleasure of getting to know better. I am overwhelmed with gratitude from the support and encouragement they offered as I accepted this new position. We do miss getting together for our monthly Volunteer Luncheon and have hopes to be able to gather again soon. These ladies and gentlemen are the backbone of our organization, and I can't thank them enough! A big thank you to our Volunteer Coordinator, Norah Kennedy for all the time she puts in scheduling our volunteers and the help evaluating our return to Walk-In Tours. In addition to a number of drop-in visitors, we had three couples from out of town come check us out as well. We were an ideal destination for those couples who were looking for a social-distanced friendly lowa Day-Trip!

Another first I got to experience was placing an order for bricks to be placed in our Foundation Walk on the south lawn! After locating a new vendor, my first brick order was placed and delivered, and with the help of our Endowment chair, Steve Samec, they were installed! We were so pleased with the new vendor, and we hope the new year will allow us to pick up the ball in our pursuit of our Chickasaw County Archives Center.

Part of building a stronger future for the Carnegie is through promotion. We are currently in the process of updating our website. This will not only give our website a fresh, new and updated look, but make it mobile friendly as well.

I've also been getting a taste of non-profit funding. Support from the City of New Hampton is crucial, but the quest for grants is on-going. The grants that were written earlier this year were mainly Covid- centered, which helped us with supplies and other equipment we wouldn't have ordinarily needed. With the help of Julie Freidhof, two more grant applications are under way. One of which will be for the expansion of the Natvig Circus permanent exhibit, the other for a computer upgrade.

To see what's been happening with our Archives and Permanent Collections, you can take a look at Juanita's Archives report. She has been an essential factor in my smooth transition into this Director position. Juanita has mentored me along the way, and our Executive Committee — Danice, Wally and Beth — have all been there to help when I have questions. I am thankful for their guidance and offer my sincere gratitude. We truly are a team here and it shows. We are in the midst of creating a Board Handbook as one step forward in building a stronger organization for the future.

I personally invite you to experience your own taste of the Carnegie. Even though our "open hours" are reduced, things are still happening here! We are still available for drop-in visits during Office Hours or by appointment. Our Christmas Exhibit we call, "A Few of Our Favorite Things," is up now through the end of December. As of now, we plan to host our annual Santa Saturday on December 5th, as well as partner with Rotary for virtual "Santa calls" and make the most out of this most wonderful time of the year ...in a social-distanced friendly environment, of course!

A Word from the Archives

Despite Covid, I have done a lot of travelling lately...travelling through time, actually...more specifically, travelling paths that go back in time. In each case, I was accompanied by a different gentleman whom I became more acquainted with as the journey progressed. One of the gentlemen has never been to Iowa, one grew up in New Hampton but no longer resides here and one drove all the way from the state of Wyoming to see where the trip might take us. Each of the gentlemen is engaged in producing an impressively in-depth account of their journey. These trips, of course, were made in my role as volunteer archivist for Carnegie Cultural Center, the agency that each of the gentlemen had contacted for assistance in their pursuit of genealogical and Chickasaw County historical information.

Since 1995, the Carnegie has striven to enhance the cultural life of this area through its sponsorship of exhibits, (both temporary and permanent), programs and performances and special projects. Through the years, the Center's ability to offer archival services has grown as the amount of archival materials donated by folks like you has grown. A search that often starts at and is coordinated by the Carnegie Cultural Center is most effectively completed in partnership with other agencies. Obviously, the County Recorder's office (only a block distant from the Cultural Center) is an invaluable resource. The digital newspaper archives available through the New Hampton and now Nashua (thanks to Jannette Hendricks' generosity) libraries is likewise a key resource. Photos, personal documents or other materials in the Carnegie's archives are often the Icing on the cake.

The local archives connect us to the broader community beyond the county lines, in a most unique way...our shared history. While the "economic" impact of an archival service is not huge, it can actually be measured. At the same time, the "social" impact in terms of community identity, pride, vitality and involvement is very real and immeasurable.

Please allow me to take a moment to go down another road. During recent housecleaning of the Cultural Center's office, we came across a small box containing a number of colorful "match pins." The pins were individually designed and crafted by Shirley Becker way back in the mid 1990s (Gee, does that make them vintage artifacts?) At that time, a crew of local volunteers was engaged in a "Keep the Lights On" campaign to repurpose the former library as a cultural center. Anyone making a monetary donation to the campaign received a match pin as a gesture of appreciation. The pins were great conversation starters. I remember wearing one on my lapel while attending meetings and people ALWAYS asked about it.

So, here we are 25+ years later. The Carnegie Cultural Center persists in its mission to establish a vital presence of the arts, history and cultural awareness for the enlightenment, enjoyment and benefit of all Chickasaw County residents and visitors. It's here because of YOU...the volunteers and donors who persist in creating and maintaining this distinctive form of community development.
